I am sending you a photograph
of the portrait which has been
presented to Auckland Castle.

The painter is W. Harold Speed.

It is thought to be a good
likeness: & the picture itself
to be a good piece of work.

At present it is on view
in the Art Exhibition in
Sunderland, and I suppose
that it will be offered to the
Royal Academy in the spring.
Its ultimate destination will

be to hang with the other
episcopal portraits in the State
Room of Auckland Castle.

The sword which I am holding
in my left hand is that which
belonged to my famous predecessor
Bishop Anthony Bek, who died
as long ago as 1310. He was
a notable soldier, & fought
against the Scots under Edward I.
His sword is preserved as an
heirloom in this house. The
military power of the Bishops

of Durham was taken away by
Henry VIII. as long ago as 1536: so
that the sword does now only symbolize
an ancient memory. But memories
are not without value, and are
ever precious to aging men. And
such, I fear, is your uncle.
